Our History of *Action*

When we began our work in 1968 as the Edmonton Women's Shelter, we were a storefront space where women could come to talk, rest, and receive information about other social assistance organizations. There were no beds, and it was not uncommon to find women sleeping upright on stools.

Today WIN House is comprised of three shelters: WIN I, WIN II, and WIN III. WIN Houses I and II can accommodate up to 60 women and children at a time for three-week stays, providing them with meals, clothing, crisis intervention support, child support, pet care, and valuable links to housing, legal, employment, and educational services. WIN III is the first and only women's shelter of its kind in Canada, devoted to addressing the unique needs of women who are refugees, recent immigrants, and victims of human trafficking with 10 beds reserved for three-month stays.

Thanks to our passionate professionals and volunteers, dedicated donors, and champions of the cause, WIN House has been able to provide safety, support, relief, and resources for women and children of all ages and cultures seeking to escape domestic violence for 50 years. With your support, we can ensure that they will have our help for 50 more.

How We *Act*

When women and children arrive at WIN House, it's often because they have nowhere else to turn and no one else to turn to. It is a frightening and confusing time for them, filled with uncertainty. Through years of experience, WIN House has developed programs and services to ensure that our clients can live a life free from abuse.

24-Hour Helpline

Thousands of women and children rely on the WIN House Helpline. In the last fiscal year, WIN House fielded more than 3,882 calls to our direct Helpline.

Crisis Intervention

From frontline response services and emergency shelter to emotional support and interpreter services, we're here when clients need us most.

Child Support

We provide childcare and school support for children and youth of all ages so their mothers can have the time and peace of mind they need to focus on finding a new home, job hunting, and building a life free from abuse for the family. Last year, our Child Support team spent over 6,384 hours providing childcare and respite care to families staying at WIN House.


Pet Safekeeping Program

Clients can focus on their journey knowing their pets are taken care of through the Alberta SPCA's Pet Safekeeping program. This program provides short-term housing at no charge for animals belonging to women coming into WIN House.

Pinn Nursing Services

Our in-shelter registered nurse provides medical assistance for a myriad of client needs including necessary triage, immunizations, counselling, pre- and post-pregnancy, dental referral, and much more. Our PINN nurse spent a total of 905 hours providing health services.

Fresh Start

When women and children leave WIN House to begin life in a new home, our Fresh Start program provides a household package with all of the essentials they will need to get settled in including clothes, small kitchen appliances, basic toiletries, and more.

Family Empowerment Program

Children exposed to domestic violence face a unique set of challenges. The Family Empowerment Program is aimed to help these children and their families gain the tools and coping mechanisms to be resilient for their own health and wellbeing.

Family Transition Program

When victims of domestic abuse are unable to enter our shelter due to space constraints or other concerns, our Transitional Support Workers can offer one-on-one counselling services out in the community.

Outreach and Planning

Our Outreach Workers provide emotional and practical support to clients both in shelter and after departure. They help survivors rebuild through court support, referrals to community resources, and assistance with joining and attending group meetings.

Public Education

One of the most powerful tools for change is education. We offer presentations to educate the public about domestic abuse. Presentations are free and available to anyone, no matter the group size (please contact us to book in advance).





Stacey's *Story*

The interesting thing about being in an abusive relationship is that it often happens without you even knowing. Or you tell yourself that words or being controlled isn't abusive. Little things turn into big things and before you know it you are in an abusive relationship. Feeling like you have to walk on eggshells with what you say quickly turns into being hit when you say the "wrong" thing. I have been out of mine for 10 years now, but when I look back at it that is exactly how it feels. Almost like I wasn't paying attention to what was happening and then one day I realized I was in an abusive relationship.

One of the hardest things for me was feeling like I lost my identity. I lost who I was and everything that was important to me. Slowly, but surely piece by piece my identity was lost. Essentially, I was lost. Every time I left I thought it was the last time. But something always happened to cause me to go back. Looking back now I am aware the reason I went back was because it was all I knew. That relationship stole everything that I was at the time and in its own odd way it was the only security that I knew. Then one day I woke up and realized I was done. It was like a light switch. I was about to open my first personal training studio and he didn't support me. That is what it took for me to finally walk away for good.

Leaving an abusive relationship isn't easy. It took me a long time to find my self-worth again and find out what was truly important to me, and to trust. The whole time I was in my abusive relationship no one knew about it. But once I was out and I shared what happened with my friends and family I had the support I needed to heal and move on. I am sure all people feel different about this, but I believe that sort of relationship will never leave you. It is something that I will always have to deal with. On a daily basis. Leaving is hard. Moving on and healing is hard. But everyone can do it.

10 years later I am living my passion. I own 2 fitness companies and spend my days helping people find the best version of themselves. I am in a relationship with a man that loves and supports me. And I am in a place where I feel comfortable sharing my story. It took a while but I am happy to be able to share my past because every woman in an abusive relationship needs to know she can find herself again. That she can move on, be happy and be loved.

Who Helps Us Act?

Over the course of the 2018 we had so many wonderful and unique third-party events to help us with our fundraising! There were close to 100 events held for us throughout Edmonton this past year hosted by companies and individuals, and each one of them was held by caring, compassionate people who wanted to help support our women and children in shelter.

From having a young boy come into the business office to drop off his birthday money for donation to us instead of having a party, to over 200 U of A law students putting on a huge production over a whole weekend to raise major funds for WIN House, to having an entire company (Vallen) choose WIN house as their charity of choice for the whole year and raising thousands of dollars for us... it was amazing. We were even gifted a new vehicle from Go Auto for our children's program which helped us ensure their safety while we transport them to and from WIN School each day.

We were the focus and financial recipients again of major golf tournaments including the Scotiabank Charity Golf Classic, IT Masters, and the Rotating and Turbomachinery Society (RATS), and each one was a great success! Our relationships with other long-term partners continued with Shopper's Drug Mart's Growing Women's Health Campaign, CTV's Toy Mountain, the Building Owners and Managers Association (BOMA) Christmas Luncheon, Rohit's Baskets of Hope, the Edmonton Eskimos, Global Give Me Shelter, Rotary Club of Edmonton Strathcona, and so many more.

Sponsorships for our two main WIN House events were at an all-time high this past year with us raising over \$70,000 in cash and over \$90,000 in in-kind sponsorships. These numbers mean that our messages are working and that more and more companies and individuals see our vision and want to be part of helping us save and change the lives of those we shelter. Incredible.



The amount of new relationships we created surpassed all other years with those interested in being a part of our growth. Here are just a few!

- **We met with the Urban Bulldogs** Against Kids Abuse (UBAKA) bike club to find common ground on how we, together, can help connect mothers and traumatized children with them for court appearances and further supports.
- **We met with Angela and her team from The Ensuite Bath & Kitchen Showroom** who went above and beyond to help us raise awareness and funds for our tweens and teens over the holidays.

- **We connected with a group of students from Operation Warmth** who wanted to help ours and other organizations keep up with the demand for warm clothes and hygiene products.
- **We worked with children from Bessie Nichols Elementary School** during gratitude Month where we were able to inspire (and be inspired!) by young kids who understand what it means to help others.

- **We worked with the ever-cool Ador from Seven80** who sold high-end men's underwear and matched that with 250 pairs of undies for women and children in shelter.
- **We were the proud recipients of Paris Jewellers "Pay It Forward" giving campaign** not once but twice in 2018, receiving both proceeds from sales and matching number of empowerment-based necklaces for us to gift to our women and teen girls in shelter.





Win FORE WIN Golf Tournament

Funding Summary


Thanks to all our sponsors and donors, this past year was a year of growth at

WIN House. The amount of support we received from existing and new partners and donors was monumental in achieving this and for our 50th year, it was a sign of the times. People give. Companies give. Foundations give... and each time, whether it be a financial donation or a gift of in-kind items, it means that we can continue to provide the services, support and resources needed to help sustain the needs of the shelters and our clients.

In the areas of grants, we received funding for our programs and services to help offset costs associated with ensuring our clients and their children receive the best care and guidance as possible. This included funding for client transportation, household package items and replacement of shelter appliances such as freezers and stoves. We also received funding for staff training and education so they can continue to stay ahead of the trends in their fields and enhance their ability to help our clients through their trauma.

Our Family Empowerment Program, that had received over \$82,000 from the Stollery Charitable Foundation for its first pilot year, was able to utilize that funding to start building and implementing a program designed to give children the coping mechanisms to become resilient and educated enough to help stop the cycle of abuse. Our partners in this program include Ward Campanelli and his team at ECHO Promotions and the wonderful Central Sewing Volunteers who make body socks, tactile pillows and weighted blankets for us to use as sensory tools.

Everything related to fund development came from people who see the problem and do what they can, however they can, to help make a difference in the lives of those who come to us in dire straits. Without the community, it would be hard to meet our \$1.5M fundraising goal every year to supplement funding received from the government. And, for the past 50 years, it is through community support that WIN House has been able to grow and work to be part of making the lives of those Women in Need just a little bit better.
